What Table 1 tells us → FTS processed **\$22.49 billion** humanitarian funding for 2024 as of 30 September 2024. This includes funding towards coordinated plans (**\$16.20 billion**) and funding falling outside the coordinated efforts (**\$6.29 billion**). GHO coverage for 2024 funding stands at **33.03 per cent** with GHO requirements in the amount of **\$49.04 billion**. Unmet requirements for 2024 stand at **\$32.84 billion (66.97 per cent)**.

What Table 2 tells us → “Food Security” has remained the most funded sector for the last three years and received **27.63 per cent** of total humanitarian funding in 2024. “Multiple sectors shared”, referring to funding disbursed among more than one sector, ranks second in 2024. Health is in third place with **\$1.95 billion** funding, corresponding to **8.68 per cent**.

Health ranked second and multi-sector third both in 2022 and 2023. However, there is **\$1.11 billion** decrease in funding towards Health sector from 2022 to 2023. Such decrease also applies to funding towards multi-sector for refugees-focused humanitarian aids from 2022 to 2023, equaling around **\$430 million**.

GBV funding for 2022 stands at **\$273.11 million**, for 2023 at **\$368.40 million** and for 2024 at **\$275.63 million** – which is slightly better in terms of per cent of total funding compared to 2022 and 2023.

What Table 3 tells us → ROMENA ranks first in 2024 with **\$5.70 billion**, corresponding to **25.35 per cent** of total humanitarian funding. Yemen (**\$1.85 billion**), OPT (**\$1.76 billion**) and Syrian Arab Republic (**\$1.10 billion**) are having the majority of the 2024 ROMENA funding. ROMENA also took the lead in 2022 and 2023 funding with **\$10.05 billion** and **\$10.39 billion** respectively.

ROSEA ranks second for the last three years and **22.08 per cent** of 2024 total humanitarian funding goes towards this region.

ROLAC is the least funded among all for the last three years, capturing **5.06 per cent** of 2024 funds, **5.36 per cent** of 2023 funds and **4.37 per cent** of 2022 funds.

What Table 4 tells us → Yemen, ranked fourth both in 2022 and 2023, is the most funded country in 2024 with **\$1.85 billion** as of 30 September 2024. OPT ranks second with **\$1.76 billion** funding, that is followed by Ukraine with **\$1.57 billion** in 2024. Sudan is in the fourth place with **\$1.43 billion** in 2024.

Ukraine was the most funded both in 2022 and 2023 with a **\$924.83 million** funding decrease from 2022 to 2023.

8.54 percent of 2022 funding, **11.18 percent** of 2023 funding and **10.07 per cent** of 2024 funding have been reported under the “Global” category for HQ support and regional humanitarian operations.

What Table 5 tells us → Across the last three years, USA has been the top donor and provides **38.63 per cent** of the total humanitarian funding in 2024 (**\$8.68 billion**). ECHO, ranked third in both 2022 and 2023, has risen to the second place in 2024 with **\$2.12 billion** funding. Germany, which occupied the second place both in 2022 and 2023, has reported significantly less contributions in 2024 and dropped to third place. The top five donors have provided **64.12 per cent** of 2024 total funding.

What Table 6 tells us → The top five recipients of 2024 consist of international NGOs reported anonymously as well as four UN agencies. This top five have received **52.92 per cent** of total funds in 2024. WFP, UNICEF and UNHCR are in the top three recipients and WFP has by far been the most funded, despite the decrease in funding amount, for the last three years.

What Table 7 tells us → National and local organizations have received **4.56 per cent (\$1.02 billion)** of the total humanitarian funding in 2024. UN Agencies, Funds and Programmes have received the most funds in 2024: **59.45 per cent (\$13.37 billion)**. The second most funded among all in 2024 is International NGOs with **\$4.89 billion (21.78 per cent)**.

What Table 8 tells us → **72 per cent** of the 2024 total humanitarian funding (**\$16.20 billion**) went towards **43** coordinated plans consisting of **24** HRPs, **8** FAs, **9** RRP and **2** other types of plans. Outside GHO funding for 2024 stands at **28.00 per cent** with **\$6.29 billion**.

What Table 9 tells us → HRPs constitute **76.53 per cent** of 2024 total GHO funding (**\$12.39 billion**). This is followed by FAs with **11.86 per cent** (**\$1.92 billion**), RRP with **11.42 per cent** (**\$1.84 billion**) and other types of plans with **0.20 per cent** (**\$31.99 million**).

GHO Requirements have risen by **8.61 per cent** from 2022 to 2023 and decreased by **12.55 percent** from 2023 to 2024 bearing in mind that 2024 figures cover the first nine months of 2024 only.

What Table 10 tells us → There is **\$471.91 million** increase in 2024 GHO requirements in a month's time. Similarly, the funding towards coordinated plans has increased by **\$1.72 billion** from end of August 2024 to end of September 2024. OPT FA is the most funded plan with **\$1.60 billion** at the end of August 2024 and **\$1.67 billion** at the end of September 2024.

Humanitarian Funding Analysis of the Gulf States- September 2024

Explanatory Notes for Readers:

- This analysis provides humanitarian funding by Gulf States including: The Kingdom of Saudi Arabia (KSA), Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, United Arab Emirates (UAE) and Bahrain. It provides general observations and then an individual analysis for each Member State.
- It is a comparative analysis across the last three years and presents humanitarian funding information reported to and processed by FTS.
- The cut-off date across 2024, 2023 and 2022 is 30 September. The dollar sign given in all tables refers to the United States dollar.

Background:

- In the context of the FTS Transformation and given increasing demands for improved reporting by Gulf States into FTS, in 2024 FTS has been executing strategic lines of action with Gulf States to strengthen the financial tracking partnership and increase their participation in FTS.

Top Findings

- Among all countries listed in Table 1, KSA is the highest contributor in the first nine months of 2024 with **\$940.98M**. In 2024 so far, KSA has supported **22** coordinated plans and has provided the most funding to the OPT Flash Appeal with **\$58.56M**. Around **75 per cent** of KSA funding is to support humanitarian efforts outside coordinated plans.
- Comparatively KSA directed **72.36 per cent** of its contributions to the coordinated plans in 2022, this rate dropped to **33.01 per cent** in 2023 and to **24.66 per cent** in 2024. The drop is a consequence of more monies going to Governments, including Yemen and Ukraine- contributions that always fall outside the coordinated efforts.
- KSA, UAE and Qatar funding has increased over the past three years. All three show considerable increases.
- While Kuwait's funding decreased from 2023 to 2024, it has increased compared to 2022.
- The only reported contribution of Oman in 2024 is **\$1.00M** towards UNICEF, for the WASH sector and within the scope of the 2024 OPT Flash Appeal. Likewise, the only reported contribution Oman made in 2023 was **\$216.422** to support the 2023 Syrian Arab Republic Regional Refugee and Resilience Plan (3RP). There is no FTS funding record from Oman for 2022.
- FTS shows no humanitarian funding from Bahrain as donor for the last three years and thus Bahrain is not included in the following deep-dive analysis.

Overview of KSA

- KSA has contributed **\$940.98M** in 2024, **\$633.71M** in 2023 and **\$254.80M** in 2022.
- In 2024, KSA has allocated **\$232.05M (24.66 per cent)** to coordinated plans and **\$708.93M (75.34 per cent)** funding for humanitarian efforts falling outside of plans. In 2023, KSA provided **\$209.15M (33.01 per cent)** inside GHO and **\$424.55M (66.99 per cent)** outside GHO funding. As for 2022, inside GHO funding stood at **\$184.36M (72.36 per cent)** and outside GHO funding at **\$70.43M (27.64 per cent)**.
- As shown in the tables below, in 2024, **74.59 per cent (\$701.86M)** of the total funding provided by KSA has gone to Yemen. Of this, the Yemen HRP 2024 received **\$55.42M** while majority of the contributions went to the Yemen Government. OPT holds second place with **\$70.18M (\$58.56M for the OPT Flash Appeal)** - a significant smaller amount when compared with Yemen. Ukraine is the third most funded country with **\$25.61M**.
- With a huge margin, the Yemen Government is by far the most funded recipient with **\$613.10M** from KSA, followed by WFP with **\$45.94M** and UNRWA with **\$40.00M** in 2024.
- In 2023, the most funded country was Ukraine receiving **47.96 per cent** of the total funding, followed by Yemen (**20.55 per cent**). The Government of Ukraine was the most funded recipient with **\$300.00M**. “Dynasafe International Group”, as being the second, received **\$33.29M** and the third ranked recipient was the “King Salman Humanitarian Aid and Relief Center” with **\$26.55M**.
- In 2022, Yemen ranked first as recipient country with **76.37 per cent** of total KSA funds. IOM was the most funded organization with **\$34.40M**, “Dynasafe International Group” the second ranked with **\$33.29M** and WHO ranked third with **\$27.91M**.
- Coordination and support services is the most funded sector in 2024, receiving **62.27 per cent** of the total funding contributed by KSA. The second most funded sector is Health with **9.86 per cent** and food security ranks third with **6.79 per cent**. The least funded sector in 2024 is Logistics (**0.04 per cent** only) and GBV ranks second to the last receiving **0.08 per cent** of the total funding from KSA.
- In 2023, **48.15 per cent** of humanitarian funding reported by KSA was associated with more than one cluster/sector. This was followed by the “health” sector, occupying the second place, by having **15.96 per cent** of the total funds.

Overview of UAE

- UAE has contributed \$351.56M in 2024, \$217.62M in 2023 and \$308.99M in 2022.
- In 2024, UAE has allocated \$311.14M (88.50 per cent) to coordinated plans and \$40.42M (11.50 per cent) funding to humanitarian efforts falling outside of plans. In 2023, UAE provided \$41.91M (19.26 per cent) inside GHO and \$175.70M (80.74 per cent) outside GHO funding. As for 2022, inside GHO funding stood at \$96.30M (31.17 per cent) and outside GHO funding at \$212.68M (68.83 per cent).
- In 2024, OPT is the most funded country (\$234.61M), followed by Sudan (\$76.22M) and Ukraine (\$11.63M).
- The Government of Türkiye was the most funded (\$105.97M) and the Government of Sudan ranked second (\$26.36M) in 2023.
- WFP received 58.34 per cent of total funds in 2024, corresponding to \$205.12M. UAE, in the second place just after the WFP, has 8.66 per cent of the total funding provided in 2024 (\$30.44M). UNRWA occupies third place with 5.69 per cent (\$20.00M).
- In 2023, Government of Türkiye ranked first with \$99.09M funding, Government of Sudan second with \$25.97M and Red Crescent Society of the UAE third with \$24.76M.
- In 2022, the Government of Ethiopia received the largest portion of funds, corresponding to \$86.07M. This was followed by WFP with \$66.35M funding.
- In 2024, Food Security is the most funded (34.44 per cent), followed by Multiple sectors (shared) with 22.15 per cent and Coordination and Support Services, ranking third, with 19.66 per cent.
- In 2023, the UAE did not provide any sectoral granularity for the largest portion of its funding and thus \$95.93M has been registered by FTS as “not specified”. Health received 20.29 per cent of total funding and ranked first, that was followed by Food Security with 15.64 per cent.
- There exists no funding towards GBV both in 2023 and 2024. As for 2022, GBV funding stood at 0.32 per cent, corresponding to \$1.00M.

Overview of Qatar

- Qatar has contributed \$202.86M in 2024, \$17.89M in 2023 and \$0.97M in 2022.
- In 2024, Qatar has allocated \$122.42M (60.35 per cent) to coordinated plans and \$80.43M (39.65 per cent) funding to humanitarian efforts falling outside of plans. In 2023, Qatar provided \$15.56M (87.02 per cent) inside GHO and \$2.32M (12.98 per cent) outside GHO funding. As for 2022, inside GHO funding stood at \$0.73M (75.36 per cent) and outside GHO funding at \$0.23M (24.64 per cent)
- OPT (\$39.26M), Syrian Arab Republic (\$29.45M) and Yemen (\$17.09M) are listed in the top three recipient countries respectively in 2024.
- Syrian Arab Republic was the most funded in 2023 with \$8.71M while Türkiye ranked second with \$6.64M and Ethiopia ranked third with \$0.79M.
- Qatar funded four countries only in 2022 by provision of close to \$1.00M (namely Cameroon, Iraq, Jordan and Pakistan).
- The Qatar Charity solely has received 52.89 per cent of the total funding in 2024. Qatar Red Crescent Society ranks second by having 9.65 percent of total funding and UNICEF is in the third place with 9.30 per cent.
- As is the case with 2024, The Qatar Charity was in the first place by receiving 76.04 per cent of the total funding and the Qatar Red Crescent Society ranked second with 9.56 per cent in 2023.
- 2022 funding was disbursed among the UN agencies only; namely UNHCR, WFP and UNICEF, which totals close to \$1.00M.
- Qatar has provided the largest portion of its funding towards Education sector in 2024 by donating \$52.17M (25.72 per cent).
- Food security took the lead in 2023 with 39.42 per cent. As for 2022, Protection ranked first with 52.03 per cent.
- There has been no GBV funding reported for the last three years.

Overview of Kuwait

- Kuwait has contributed **\$40.61M** in 2024, **\$109.54M** in 2023 and **\$16.68M** in 2022.
- In 2024, Kuwait has allocated **\$34.45M (84.83 per cent)** to coordinated plans and **\$6.16M (15.17 per cent)** funding to humanitarian efforts falling outside of plans. In 2023, Kuwait provided **\$85.48M (78.04 per cent)** inside GHO and **\$24.05M (21.96 per cent)** outside GHO funding. As for 2022, inside GHO funding stood at **\$10.30M (61.74 per cent)** and outside GHO funding at **\$6.38M (38.26 per cent)**.
- Kuwait's most top funded country in 2024 is OPT, which has received **78.84 per cent** of total funding provided by Kuwait. This is followed by Yemen with **4.86 per cent** and Lebanon with **2.19 per cent**.
- In 2023, almost **93 per cent** of funding of Kuwait went towards Syrian Arab Republic (**47.21 per cent**) and Türkiye (**45.52 per cent**) only. This mainly relates to the Kuwait's contributions to the Türkiye Earthquake Flash Appeal 2023 in amount of **\$43.85M**, to the Syria Earthquake Flash Appeal 2023 in amount of **\$26.85M** and to the Syrian Arab Republic Humanitarian Response Plan 2023 in amount of **\$8.00M**.
- Afghanistan (**23.97 per cent**) and Yemen (**23.97 per cent**) received almost half of Kuwait's funding in 2022 and ranked the top two recipient countries respectively.
- UNRWA takes the lead in 2024 with **\$27.00M** funding, followed by the Jordan National Red Crescent Society by having **\$3.55M**.
- UN Agencies, Funds and Programmes were in the top three in both 2022 and 2023. The top three received **49.32 per cent** of total funding in 2023 and **65.54 per cent** in 2022.
- Kuwait has not provided sectoral granularity for **64.01 per cent** of its funding in 2024, corresponding to **\$26.00M**. Food security ranks first in 2024 by receiving **\$6.20M**.
- Emergency Shelter and NFI sector was in the first place with **28.43 per cent** in 2023. Kuwait contributed **\$27.66M** of its total donations towards more than one sector in 2023.
- In 2022, Kuwait did not provide sectoral information for the largest portion of funds it provided (**70.73 per cent**), i.e., **\$11.80M**.
- Among all, there has been no funding for GBV for the last three years.

Financial Tracking Services (FTS) 2024 Gulf States Strategic Lines of Action - Internal Working Document

This document outlines FTS's general effort and work focus with Gulf States. The effort is monitored quarterly and continues to evolve.

Objective and Context: In the context of the FTS Transition, including partnership strengthening and with the overall objective of increasing Gulf States engagement with and reporting into FTS (in kind and financial), FTS will bolster its work with Gulf States- namely Qatar, Kuwait, United Arab Emirates, Bahrain, and the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia in first instance- and with humanitarian actors from the region. And in the spirit of “shared ownership for financial tracking across the humanitarian community”, this will include working closely with other parts of OCHA like OAD and HFRMD, including Humanitarian Advisor Teams (HATs) and Liaison Offices (LOs) as appropriate and other part of the humanitarian community like the Aid Transparency Initiative (ATI).

Key Ongoing Actions:

External to OCHA

Monthly Meetings: Building on the existing relationship with key focal points both at governmental and at civil society levels, FTS meets monthly - individually per country- with partners to discuss reporting, answer questions, and highlight related financial tracking topics as the situation across the globe evolves. More importantly, the meetings are an opportunity for FTS to hear directly from partners in terms of how the service can be more helpful and responsive to their needs.

FTS Tool and Services in Arabic: Building on FTS Arabic language capacity, FTS works to ensure its tools and services (including reporting template and tutorials) are also available in Arabic and are shared widely with relevant partners.

Capacity Building activities (virtual and in country): Given these partners constitutes a “non-traditional” block of reporters into FTS, special attention is placed on capacity building efforts, including but not limited to FTS basic training (how to navigate the page and report into FTS), FTS advanced training (how to use FTS to analyze available data from different vantage points: contributions, recipients), how to use FTS to help decision making i.e. what and where to fund, and more. At the same time, FTS invests effort to deliver requested training both virtually and in country when requested.

Audits: To gauge the effectiveness of these actions, FTS carries out internal Audits at the country level to gauge the trend, both in terms of volume and granularity and to compare field level reporting/observations (where it exists) with official reporting into FTS. Findings are in turn discussed with partners during the monthly meetings. This includes observations for in-kind and financial contributions.

Internal to OCHA

Shared ownership: FTS engages with other parts of OCHA to jointly agree on the lines of action and to ask for amplification of agreed to key messages with Member States and humanitarian partners at large: 1) reporting into FTS; 2) utilization of FTS reporting template; 3) Decision making on what and where to fund.

Critical role of HATs and/or LOs: These OCHA entities have an important role given their mandate and location. Due to their ongoing effort to develop and nurture the relationship with this block of countries positioning of FTS as a service to 1) highlight their generous in kind and financial contributions across the globe; 2) Inform them on progress against coordinated humanitarian requirements; and 3) Inform on where and what to fund, is critical. On FTS reporting, where MOUs are being signed, insertion of a specific FTS requirement is an important option to consider.
