Overview of Humanitarian Funding

What Table 1 tells us → FTS processed **\$7.28 billion** humanitarian funding as of 30 April 2024. This includes funding towards coordinated plans (**\$4.33 billion**) and funding falling outside the coordinated efforts (**\$2.95 billion**). The 2024 total is a **\$3.74 billion** decrease when compared to **\$11.05 billion** reached at the same time last year. In addition to 2024 fundings, FTS has received and processed **\$1.26 billion** for 2025 and **\$365.60 million** for 2026. Increased monies in 2022 and 2023 are attributed to increased funding towards Ukraine, something not seen in 2024.

What Table 2 tells us → 'Food security' and 'Health' rank the first and second respectively for the last three years in a row. Multiple sectors shared, meaning reported as shared sectors, rank the third for both 2022 and 2024 whereas multi-sector for refugees ranks the third in 2023 funding. GBV funding increased by **\$63.92 million** from 2022 to 2023 (**0.34 per cent**) and on the contrary dropped one place in the overall ranking from 14th to 15th. The GBV funding is in the 12th place among overall sectoral ranking as of 30 April 2024 with **\$121.92 million** funding,

What Table 3 tells us → Consistent with the last two years, MENA ranks first with a **24.59 per cent** share of the total humanitarian funding in 2024 as of 30 April. Likewise, SEA takes the second place with **16.84 per cent** followed by WCA in the third place with **14.35 per cent** in 2024.

What Table 4 tells us → Occupied Palestinian Territory is the most funded in 2024 with **\$743.37 million**. Ukraine, the most funded country in 2022 and 2023, places third in the first four months of 2024. The “Global” category accounts for HQ support and regional operations. FTS will continue working with reporters to gain greater geographic granularity behind these numbers as well as add a regional dimension to the global category.

What Table 5 tells us → Across the last three years, USA, Germany and ECHO have been the top three donors. Japan ranked fourth both in 2022 and 2023 and is in the fifth place in 2024. Sweden rose from the seventh place in 2022 to the fifth in 2023 and to the fourth in 2024 funding. The top five donors provided **63.16 per cent** of total humanitarian funding for the 01 January 2024 – 30 April 2024 period.

What Table 6 tells us → WFP and UNICEF have remained the most funded organizations in 2022, 2023 and 2024. The ICRC has replaced UNHCR and ranked the third in 2024 as compared to the previous two years. Overall, the top five recipients have received **42.33 per cent** of the total humanitarian funding in 2024.

What Table 7 tells us → In 2024, Governments have provided **85.15 per cent** of total humanitarian funding (**\$6.20 billion**). This has been followed by contributions by multilateral organizations corresponding to **12.03 per cent** of total funds recorded in 2024 and by pooled funds with **2.31 per cent**. These were also the top three donor types in 2022 and 2023.

What Table 8 tells us → Funds allocated to the national and local organizations stand at **1.25 per cent** (**\$91.09 million**) of the total humanitarian funding in 2024. This is miniscule compared to the most funded organizations that are UN Agencies, Funds and Programmes, holding **54.37 per cent** of the 2024 total humanitarian funding and far from meeting the 25 per cent commitment set out by the Grand Bargain.

What Table 9 tells us → **60 per cent** of the 2024 total humanitarian funding went towards the coordinated efforts by 30 April 2024. This corresponds to **\$4.33 billion** against the **\$48.28 billion** 2024 GHO requirements.

What “End-of-year Reference Table” tells us → Late reporting not only adds to the workload of FTS but also weakens accuracy of real-time data. An example is 2023 funding level, which was **\$29.09 billion** as of 31 December 2023 as is seen above and subsequently **\$33.63 billion** as of 30 April 2024. This clearly tells us that FTS received and processed **\$4.54 billion** additional 2023 funding within the first four months of 2024.
