This FTS-produced report presents humanitarian funding information reported to and processed by FTS. The 2022 and 2023 figures are yearly whereas 2024 figures are as of 31 December 2024. Overview of Humanitarian Funding

What Table 1 tells us → The total 2024 humanitarian funding reported to and processed by the FTS stands at **\$32.06 billion** as of 31 December 2024. Although this 2024 total appears to be **\$4.59 billion** less than the 2023 total, it is considered high for this time of the year. This relates to the facts that (1) 2024 total shown above is for the year from 01 January to 31 December 2024 whereas the 2023 total shows funding for a 24-month period: 01 January 2023 – 31 December 2024; (2) not all 2024 funding reports have been received by the FTS team by 31 December 2024. Only **45.55 per cent** of the 2024 GHO requiring **\$49.59 billion** has been met: **\$22.58 billion**. The gap between the GHO requirements and financial resources for 2024 stands at **\$27.00 billion**.

What Table 2 tells us → Food security is consistently the most funded sector across the last three years, receiving **\$8.20 billion** in 2024. Multi-sector, the second most funded sector in 2024 with **\$4.08 billion**, ranked third in both 2022 and 2023. The health sector, which ranked second in 2022 and 2023, dropped to third place in 2024. GBV remains one of the most underfunded sectors, with **1.28 percent** of total funding in 2024.

What Table 3 tells us → MENA has been the most funded region over the last three years, receiving **27.07 per cent** of the total funding in 2024, or **\$8.67 billion**. The OPT, Yemen, the Syrian Arab Republic and Lebanon are the most funded countries in this region, with a total of **\$7.56 billion**. In other words, these four countries have received **87.12 per cent** of the total funding allocated to MENA in 2024. For **\$436.05 million** of the total funding in 2024 (i.e. **1.36 percent**), no region was specified by the reporters. LAC has been the least funded region over the last three years, with a share of only **5.17 per cent** of total funding in 2024, **5.34 per cent** in 2023 and **4.34 per cent** in 2022.

What Table 4 tells us → “Global” is the most funded in both 2023 and 2024. The most funded country in 2024 is OPT and the “Escalation of Hostilities in the OPT Flash Appeal” received **\$2.52 billion (89.03 per cent)** of the total funding going to the country by the end of December 2024. Some **39.22 per cent** of total funding, i.e. **\$12.57 billion**, was allocated to the top five countries listed above in 2024. Afghanistan and the Syrian Arab Republic, which were in the top five in 2022 and 2023, were sixth and seventh respectively in 2024.

What Table 5 tells us → The USA has been the top donor for the last three years, providing **43.04 per cent** of total funding in 2024. Contributions through ECHO have overtaken those of Germany and thus Germany has lost its second place for 2022 and 2023 to ECHO in 2024. The top five donors provided **68.40 per cent** of the total global humanitarian funding in 2024; i.e. **\$21.93 billion**.

What Table 6 tells us → The top five recipients of 2024 funding are UN agencies, funds and programmes as well as international NGOs reported as confidential and the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC). These top five recipients received **55.02 per cent** of total funding in 2024, corresponding to **\$17.64 billion**. The top five recipients remained the same for 2022 and 2023 funding, with WFP topping the list, as it did for 2024 funding. The second most funded is UNHCR in both 2023 and 2024, whereas in 2022 it was UNICEF. The third most funded organization is UNICEF in both

2023 and 2024, which was the second most funded organization in 2022. International NGOs listed as confidential have been in fourth place over the last three years. Similarly, the ICRC has ranked fifth for the last three years.

What Table 7 tells us → National and local organizations received **\$1.79 billion** in 2024, **\$2.78 billion** in 2023 and **\$1.70 billion** in 2022. Although we know we are far from the target; FTS uses these underfunded figures to advocate for more

funding for national and local organizations. UN Agencies, Funds and Programmes have received the most funding over the last three years: **\$19.49 billion** in 2024, **\$20.70 billion** in 2023 and **\$27.66 billion** in 2022. International NGOs are the second most funded over the last three years: **\$6.63 billion** in 2024, **\$8.02 billion** in 2023 and **\$6.88 billion** in 2022.

What Table 8 tells us → The 2024 GHO, consisting of **49** coordinated plans, received **70 per cent** of total humanitarian funding. The remaining **30 per cent** was to support activities outside the 2024 GHO. The proportion of funding within the GHO has remained more or less the same over the last three years.

What Table 9 tells us → The 2024 GHO is made up of **24** Humanitarian Response Plans (HRP), **9** Regional Plans (REG), **10** Flash Appeals (FA), and **6** other types of plans. Funding for the 2024 GHO, which stood at **\$22.58 billion** at the end of December, is expected to increase in the coming months as FTS has yet to receive additional 2024 funding reports from reporters. This would change the 2024 GHO coverage rate, which stood at **45.55 per cent** on 31 December 2024. Although 2024 has the highest number of coordinated plans over the last 3 years, it also has the lowest GHO requirements as compared to 2022 and 2023.
