

# February 2025 Monthly Report

## Overview of Humanitarian Funding

**What Table 1 tells us** → Looking at the first two months of the last three years, total humanitarian funding has fluctuated from **\$6.15 billion** in 2023 to **\$4.36 billion** in 2024 and **\$4.44 billion** in 2025. 2025 GHO coverage stands at **5.45 per cent**. Funding outside the plans has been decreasing over the last three years. This is an indication that donors are tending to allocate more funds to coordinated humanitarian efforts.

**What Table 2 tells us** → Of the total 2025 funding tracked, **\$752.91 million** is reported for more than one sector. This is followed by food security, health, other and protection respectively. Food security has received the most funding over the last three years. While not included in the table above, it is worth noting that funding reported by FTS without sectoral details accounts for **25.73 per cent** of total 2025 funding (**\$1.14 billion**), **9.85 per cent** of total 2024 funding (**\$3.33 billion**), and **10.12 per cent** of total 2023 funding (**\$3.74 billion**). GBV ranked **15<sup>th</sup>** among all sectors for both 2023 and 2024 and is in **12<sup>th</sup>** place in 2025.

**What Table 3 tells us** → MENA was the most funded region in 2023 and 2024 and ranks **2<sup>nd</sup>** in 2025. LAC is the least funded region over the last three years. Specifically in 2025, the most funded LAC countries are Colombia (**1.58 per cent**), Haiti (**1.11 per cent**), Venezuela (**0.59 per cent**) and Peru (**0.27 per cent**). The LAC countries with zero funding in 2025 are Saint Vincent and the Grenadines, Grenada, Uruguay, Panama, Costa Rica and Aruba (Netherlands).

**What Table 4 tells us** → “Global” is the most funded over the last three years and includes program support costs as well as support to headquarter operations and for global programmes across humanitarian entities. The most funded countries in 2025 are those with HNRPs: Ukraine, Afghanistan, Sudan and South Sudan respectively. The top five countries received **42.11 per cent** of total funding in 2025. The OPT, Ukraine, Yemen and Sudan were the most funded in 2024 respectively.

**What Table 5 tells us** → Majority of all humanitarian funding comes from governments and public institutions, dominating global humanitarian funding over the past three years with their contributions hovering around **65 per cent** of global humanitarian funding. Over the last three years, the USA has been the largest donor, Germany the second and ECHO the third.

**What Table 6 tells us** → The top five recipients of funding in 2025 are UN agencies, funds and programmes and CERF. These top five recipients received **32.44 per cent** of total funding in 2025, equivalent to **\$1.44 billion**. In 2024, **55.09 per cent** of global humanitarian funding (**\$18.65 billion**) went to the top five recipients: UN agencies, funds and programmes,

confidential international NGOs and the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC). The top five recipients in 2023 were the same as in 2024, receiving **51.53 percent** of global humanitarian funding (**\$19.05 billion**).

**What Table 7 tells us** → In recognition of the fact that the first response to every emergency is delivered by the affected communities, FTS continues to closely track funding to national and local organizations. National and local organizations have received **1.91 per cent** of total 2025 humanitarian funding only. This **1.91 per cent** is critically low as compared to **42.46 per cent** of total 2025 funding received by UNFPAs and **32.74 per cent** by INGOs.

*What Table 8 tells us* → As of 28 February 2025, only **5.45 per cent** of the 2025 global appeal was funded and it is now more vital than ever that humanitarian assistance is fully resourced. 2025 GHO funding progress does not provide the full picture due to the plans have yet to be published. It is too early to make any comparison between 2025 GHO funding progress with that of 2023 and 2024. *What Table 9 tells us* → Funding for HRPs increased by **\$856.21 million**, REGs by **\$51.15 million**, FAs by **\$35.72 million** and other types of plans by **\$2.87 million** in one month. The GHO ratio also increased from **3.34 per cent** to **5.45 per cent**. No additional plans were published between the last monthly report at the end of January 2025 and the end of February 2025. As a result, the number of plans published remained at **43**.
