Overview of Humanitarian Funding

What Table 1 tells us → Total humanitarian funding for 2025 tracked by FTS as of 31 January 2025 is **\$3.63 billion**. In 2025, Inter Agency Standing Committee (IASC) partners are appealing for **\$44.69 billion** and **\$1.49 billion** have been tracked in support of the coordinated effort. This number is expected to increase as more plans are to be officially published. (Note: During January 2025, FTS received **33** funding reports from donors and recipients of humanitarian funding: **14** reports for the year 2024, **6** for 2025, **1** multi-year for 2021-2025, **1** multi-year for 2021-2027, **1** multi-year for 2023-2025, **6** multi-years for 2024-2025, **1** multi-year for 2024-2026, **1** multi-year for 2025-2026 and **2** multi-years for 2025-2027.)

What Table 2 tells us → Over **11.41 per cent** of the total 2025 funding tracked is for more than one sector. This is followed by food security, protection, health and other respectively. Food security has received the most funding over the last three years. Funding shared with FTS by reporters without specifying a sector account for **32.13 per cent** of total 2025 funding (**\$1.16 billion**), **10.12 per cent** of total 2024 funding (**\$3.34 billion**), and **10.22 per cent** of total 2023 funding (**\$3.74 billion**). GBV ranked **15th** among all sectors for both 2023 and 2024 and is in **10th** place in 2025 - among the least funded given there are 21 sectors and areas of responsibility AORs.

What Table 3 tells us → MENA was the most funded region in 2022 and 2023 and ranks **2nd** in 2025. With **84.04 per cent** of the total, the OPT, Yemen, the Syrian Arab Republic and Lebanon are the most funded countries in this region in 2025, with a total of **\$515.43 million**. LAC is the least funded region over the last three years, with a share of only **1.30 per cent** of total funding in 2025, **0.61 per cent** in 2024 and **1.30 per cent** in 2022.

What Table 4 tells us → “Global” is the most funded over the last three years, which includes HQ institutional monies. The most funded countries in 2025 are those with coordinated plans; Ukraine, South Sudan, OPT and Afghanistan respectively, bearing in mind that the amount of funding going to these countries and thus the ranking will evolve throughout 2025. The OPT, Ukraine, Yemen and Sudan were the most funded in 2024. The top five received **38.97 per cent** of total funding in 2024. This ratio was **41.24 per cent** for 2023 funding.

What Table 5 tells us → The top five donors provided **64.28 per cent** of the global humanitarian funding in 2025 (**\$2.33 billion**.) Likewise, the top five contributed **\$22.49 billion** in 2024, corresponding to **67.98 per cent**. Back in 2023, this ratio was **63.75 per cent** with **\$23.38 billion**. The top five have dominated global humanitarian funding for the past three years, with their contributions hovering around **65 per cent** of global humanitarian funding.

What Table 6 tells us → The top five recipients of funding in 2025 are UN agencies, funds and programmes and CERF. These top five recipients received **27.89 per cent** of total funding in 2025, equivalent to **\$1.01 billion**. In 2024, **55.07 per cent** of global humanitarian funding (**\$18.22 billion**) went to the top five recipients: UN agencies, funds and programmes, confidential international NGOs and the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC). The top five recipients in 2023 were the same as in 2024, receiving **51.97 per cent** of global humanitarian funding (**\$19.06 billion**).

What Table 7 tells us → National and local organizations received **\$79.48 million** in 2025, **\$1.95 billion** in 2024 and **\$2.80 billion** in 2023. However they are at the heart of the humanitarian response, the funding level they have received remains quite low over the last three years and in comparison to the Grand Bargain commitment of 25 per cent: **7.66 per cent** of total 2023 funding, **5.91 per cent** of 2024 and **2.19 per cent** of 2025. UN Agencies, Funds and Programmes have received the most funding over the last three years: **\$20.70 billion** in 2023, **\$20.13 billion** in 2024 and **\$1.33 billion** in 2025.

What Table 8 tells us → Humanitarian funding towards coordinated plans hovered around **70 per cent** in both 2023 and 2024. On the contrary, inside GHO funding in 2025 stood at **41 per cent** due to the fact that only **24** out of **43** plans were published by 31 January 2025.

What Table 9 tells us → The number of HRPs has been decreasing over the past three years while the number of RHPs has remained consistent. The number of Flash Appeals and those categorized as “other” have varied across the same period. The 2025 GHO is made up of **23** Humanitarian Needs and Response Plans (HNRP), **9** Regional Plans (REG), **8** Flash Appeals (FA), and **3** other types of plans. By 31 January 2025, only **24** out of **43** plans had been published: **13** out of **23** HNRPs, **7** out of **8** FAs, **1** out of **9** REGs, **3** out of **3** other types of plans. This results in actual needs of **\$25.66 billion**, funding of **\$1.47 billion**, and ultimately **5.75 per cent** of actual GHO coverage (as opposed to what is shown in the table above).
