## Overview of Humanitarian Funding

**What Table 1 tells us** → FTS processed **\$16.39 billion** humanitarian funding as of 31 July 2024. This includes funding towards coordinated plans (**\$12.26 billion**) and funding outside the coordinated effort (**\$4.12 billion**). GHO coverage for 2024 funding stands at **25.04 per cent** with GHO requirements at **\$48.99 billion**. Total humanitarian funding witnessed a net decrease of **\$1.92 billion** in 2024 at the end of July when compared to end of July 2023. The percentage of GHO funding is slightly higher this year on account of the decreasing requirements.

**What Table 2 tells us** → **74.84 per cent** of the 2024 total humanitarian funding went towards **43** coordinated plans consisting of **24** HRPs, **8** FAs, **9** RRP and **2** other types of plans.

**What Table 3 tells us** → 'Food security' has received almost one fourth of the total humanitarian funding in 2024. This is followed by "health" with **11.12 per cent**. GBV funding increased by **\$9.08 million** from 2022 to 2023 and by **\$152.2 million** from 2023 to 2024. GBV funding stands in the 14<sup>th</sup> place as of 31 July 2024 with **\$258.84 million**, corresponding to **1.58 per cent** of the total humanitarian funding. This is higher than both 2022 and 2023 at this time of the year.

**What Table 4 tells us** → The Middle East and North Africa (MENA) region is the highest recipient of humanitarian funds over the past three years for this period. Similarly, Southern & Eastern Africa (SEA) ranks second for the last three years. All regions show a decline from 2023 to 2024: i.e. **\$697.94 million** for MENA, **\$970.65 million** for SEA, **\$201.07 million** for AP, **\$334.40 million** for Europe, **\$75.80 million** for LAC and **\$306.50 million** for WCA. "Global" is the only category that shows an increase in value (by over **\$650 million**). The rise in this category is due to FTS's inability to process the increasing regional funding being reported and instead processing them against the "global" category. FTS is committed to finding a solution to this conundrum rectifying this situation currently driven by tool limitations.

**What Table 5 tells us** → Humanitarian efforts in OPT are the most funded in 2024 with **\$1.67 billion**, corresponding to **10.22 per cent** of the total global humanitarian funding in 2024 at the end of July. Interestingly, OPT was not among the top five in either 2022 or 2023. Ukraine follows with **\$1.28 billion** funding- although the amount of money has decreased in 2024 when compared to 2022 and 2023. Ukraine has been among the top three funded operations across the last three years for this period. The Syrian Arab Republic, Sudan and the DRC rank third, fourth and fifth respectively in 2024.

**What Table 6 tells us** → USA has been the top donor across the last three years. However, in absolute terms money contributed has dramatically dropped in 2024 (around **\$2.44 billion**). (BPRM has yet to submit a single report to FTS in 2024 with the FTS team working hard to overcome the impasse). ECHO ranks second for the last three years and compared to 2023 has contributed **\$405.90 million** less in 2024. Japan, like last year, ranks third with **\$1.08 billion** - **\$285.16 million** less than last year. In 2024, the top five donors have provided **\$3.29 billion** and the top ten donors **\$2.63 billion** less than last year. The USA, ECHO, Japan and Germany shortfalls are the most significant with important increases from U.K., Sweden and Switzerland, not enough to make up for the deficits, however.

**What Table 7 tells us** → WFP has remained the most funded organization in 2022, 2023 and 2024 receiving almost one fourth of the reported total humanitarian funding in 2024. For the last three years, UNICEF and UNHCR have occupied the second and third places respectively. IOM, ranked fifth in 2022 and 2023, has risen to fourth place in 2024. Overall, the top five recipient organizations have received **48.67 per cent** of the total humanitarian funding in 2024. The variation from year to year has been slight when compared to 2023.

**What Table 8 tells us** → National and local organizations have received **2.45 per cent (\$401.25 million)** of the total humanitarian funding in 2024. This is a significant fall of **\$612.74 million** as compared to funding data as of 31 July 2023. The UN Agencies, Funds and Programmes are the most funded with **57.24 per cent** of the total humanitarian funds in 2024. However, funding towards the UN Agencies, Funds and Programmes has also witnessed a **\$1.09 billion** decrease from 2022 to 2023 and **\$1.29 billion** decrease from 2023 to 2024.
