Overview of Humanitarian Funding

What Table 1 tells us → A three-year comparison shows that humanitarian funding at the end of November 2024 is higher by **\$3.04 billion** as compared to the same time in 2023. The **\$49.59 billion** GHO requirement in 2024 is **\$3.68 billion** more than the **\$45.90 billion** originally set for 2024. As of the end of November 2024, **43.39 percent** of this 2024 GHO requirement has been met through the provision of **\$21.51 billion** in coordinated plans.

What Table 2 tells us → FTS processed **\$30.29 billion** funding for 2024. **71.02 per cent** of this total has been allocated to support coordinated plans and **28.98 per cent** supports outside activities. The unmet requirements for 2024 stand at **\$28.07 billion**.

What Table 1 and Table 2 tell us is that late reporting is significant; specifically for 2022 **\$10.65 billion** was reported throughout 2023 and 2024. Specifically for 2023, **\$9.36 billion** additional funding was processed in 2024.

What Table 3 tells us → Food security, multi-sector and health rank in the top three over the last three years. Despite taking the lead in 2024, the funding towards food security has decreased as compared to 2022 and 2023. Apart from the sectoral breakdown seen above, **\$3.48 billion**, i.e. **11.51 per cent** of total 2024 funding has been submitted as “not specified”, meaning lacking sectoral granularity. GBV remains underfunded by capturing **1.29 per cent** of total funds in 2024 and ranks **14th**.

What Table 4 tells us → MENA, facing protracted conflicts, pandemic outbreaks, climate shocks and natural/human-made crises, is the most funded region in 2024. OPT, Yemen, Syrian Arab Republic and Lebanon solely received **81.25 per cent** of total funds directed at this region, i.e. **\$6.70 billion**. **79.18 per cent** of the total funding that MENA has received in 2024 is allocated to coordinated plans, equaling to **\$6.53 billion**. No region has been specified by reporters for **\$643.73 million** of total 2024 funding (i.e. **2.12 per cent**). Rate for selection of multi-country by reporters dwindled from **3.29 per cent** in 2022 to **1.30 per cent** in 2023, and likewise to **0.59 per cent** in 2024.

What Table 5 tells us → “Global” is the most funded both in 2023 and 2024. The most funded country is OPT in 2024 and the “Escalation of Hostilities in the OPT Flash Appeal” received **\$2.37 billion** of total funding going towards the country by the end of November 2024. **38.22 per cent** of total funding has been allocated to the above-listed top five in 2024. This ratio was **41.16 per cent** for 2023 funding and **41.52 per cent** for 2022.

What Table 6 tells us → The USA is the top funder over the last three years. Despite a **\$276.99 million** increase in its contributions from 2023 to 2024, both 2023 and 2024 funds of the USA are quite low compared to its 2022 funding. Contributions through ECHO has overtaken that of Germany and thus Germany has lost its second place for 2022 and 2023 to ECHO in 2024. The top five funders have provided **69.53 per cent** of the total humanitarian funding globally in 2024.

What Table 7 tells us → The top five recipients, i.e. UN agencies as well as international NGOs reported as confidential, have received **54.95 per cent** of total funds in 2024; corresponding to **\$16.64 billion**. WFP has remained the most funded organization over the last three years. UNHCR, which was in the third place in 2022, ranks second both in 2023 and 2024. UNICEF, the second most funded organization in 2022, has fallen to the third place both in 2023 and 2024. International

NGOs, masked by the FTS at the request of the donor or recipient of funding, rank fourth over the last three years. The International Committee of the Red Cross was in fifth place both in 2022 and 2023 while IOM ranks fifth in 2024.

What Table 8 tells us → National and local organizations have received **4.11 per cent (\$1.24 billion)** of the total humanitarian funding in 2024. This is a **\$1.11 billion** decrease when compared to **\$2.36 billion** allocated to national and local organizations in 2023. UN Agencies are the most funded by having **\$18.38 billion** in 2024, corresponding to **60.67 per cent** of total funding. When looking at the funding trend for the UN agencies over the last three years, we observe a **25.17 per cent** decrease in funding from 2022 to 2023 and **11.20 per cent** decrease from 2023 to 2024.

What Table 9 tells us → 2024 GHO requires **\$49.59 billion** to assist people in need through **49** coordinated plans. **71.02 per cent** of the total 2024 humanitarian funding is directed at those **49** plans as of end of November. **\$3.01 billion** in GHO funding was reported during the month of November 2024, bringing total funding to **\$21.51 billion**. This inside GHO figure of 2024 is **\$1.32 billion** more than at the same time last year.

What Table 10 tells us → GHO requirements rose by **\$4.44 billion** from 2022 to 2023 and has dwindled by **\$6.49 billion** from 2023 to 2024. There is a noticeable decrease in GHO funding by **\$5.27 billion** from 2022 to 2023 and again another **\$3.69 billion** decrease from 2023 to 2024. This gradual decrease may be due in part to additional 2022 and 2023 funding reports that keep coming following end of 2022 and end of 2023 as well as the fact that not all 2024 reports had been received by the end of November 2024.
